

Lindy Chamberlain was released from prison yesterday.InOctober1982,she had been found guiltyofthemurderofherbabydaughter.Police had been searching for a British tourist who had fallen to his death from Uluru in an area full of dingolairswhensuddenlytheyfoundthemissing pieceofevidencefromtheChamberlaincase-the baby daughter Azaria's missing jacket.

Five and a half years ago, on August 17, 1980, the Chamberlains spent their holiday at a

campsite near Uluru. Suddenly their baby Azaria disappeared and the parents were sure a dingo had taken her.

The husband, Michael, was serving as minister in a Seventh Day Adventist Church at the time, and soon there were rumours that the name Azaria meant sacrifice in the wilderness and that Lindy, the mother, had killed her own daughter.

After the police had examined the campsite they were convinced that Lindy was guilty of murder

During the trial in September 1982, the police testified that they had found the baby's blood in the car, that the rips in her clothes had been made by scissors – not by a dingo – and an expert had found a bloody human handprint on the clothes.

On October 29, the jury found Lindy guilty of murder and she was sentenced to life imprisonment with hard labour.

Yesterday, however, after nearly three and a half years in prison Lindy was released, thanks to the police finding Azaria's jacket.
